




Skiing as a Metaphor for Leadership

First-time skiers fall into two categories. One group never ski again after their first skiing experience—estimates for this group range as high as 75%.

Those in the second group become passionate fans of the sport. Typically, they are introduced to the sport at an early age, and they learn very quickly—they are inspired. Some go on to race or even become professional skiers. The rest become recreational skiers.

Recreational skiers continue to learn into their 20s and then they embark on careers, get married, take on mortgages and financial responsibilities, have children and have less time. Also, their bodies become a little creakier. Their skiing skills plateau, and their skiing becomes more conservative as they age. They become content with their existing skill levels, less interested in learning, and settle into modest aspirations for their skiing activities. As they move into middle-age they become less adventurous and the caliber of their skiing declines. Eventually, they give up skiing altogether. There are many exceptions to this trajectory, but it is the general pattern, and the chart of their skiing life follows the typical bell curve.



Skiing is a metaphor for life. As it is with skiing, so it is with many other aspects of our lives—how we are as skiers parallels how we are as leaders, friends, spouses, parents and citizens—we start off with great passion and enthusiasm, but this energy tapers off as our lives unfold.

When we bring leaders to the mountain—[The Leadership Summit](#)—and tell them that we can re-energize their passion for skiing, many express disbelief. But when they are on the snow and experience the inspiration that comes from a breakthrough, discovering that they can ski at levels they never dreamed they would achieve in their lives, they are converted. They become so reenergized and exhilarated that, metaphorically speaking, they feel they don't even need an airplane to fly home!





Then a higher-level conversation begins: Why do we need to go to the top of a mountain to make a breakthrough like this? Why can't we make breakthroughs like this in every other aspect of our lives? Why do we accept the myth that breakthroughs cannot be achieved quickly? Or, that we can't change?
